Summary

The electronic services provided through IReL enabled the Library to provide access to a range of electronic journals and databases which it could not do within its existing limited budget. The forthcoming addition of material in the Humanities and Social Sciences will be of great benefit to researchers.

The year saw the creation of a separate catalogue for the Russell Library print collection and the number of catalogue records increase to 6,500. Disseminating information about the holdings of this unique collection will be of immense value.

A comparison of library statistics for 2004/05 and five years ago, 2000/01, show a decrease in the library grant of almost 8% and the increasing dependency of the Library on income from charged services, from academic departments and other units. Overall the non-pay budget remains almost the same as five years ago. When the substantial inflation on library material and additional support for new subjects and courses are taken into account the result is a serious decrease in library income.

The figures also show the continuing decline in the use of traditional services such as borrowing and inter-library loans. The greater availability and use of electronic services have brought about an increased demand for other services such as enquiries and information training.

The national survey of researchers carried out during the year showed NUIM as rating well in some areas but below average in others. Aside from web search engines researchers rated books and online periodicals as their most used sources of information and satisfaction with NUIM holdings rated 10% below average for both. Almost two thirds of NUIM researchers responded that the Library was not adequately resourced to support research, again over 10% below average.

The print collection continued to grow and a large section of material on level 2 was reshelved in an effort to create extra space.

Services and support

• Information Desk

The service at the Information Desk continued to expand and develop, with staff handling almost 12,000 queries, a 44% increase on the previous year. The demand for subject information declined by almost a third, indicating the greater use of web services for this type of request.

• Information skills training

A new training programme to introduce students to a range of available services was run over a fiveweek period at the beginning of the academic year. 200 students participated.

Subject Librarians provided training to library users across a broad range of subject areas in consultation with the relevant academic departments. Training varied from introduction to library resources for undergraduates to detailed workshops for postgraduates. The training sessions were designed to help students use library resources in an efficient and effective manner and also gain awareness of the importance of information handling skills. In all 2,500 students received training.

• e-Learning initiatives

The e-Learning Committee recommended using a locally devised product for 2004/05 for the final year of a three-year trial of virtual learning environments (VLE). The chosen product for the year was MyVLE. Approximately 70 staff and 2,500 students were enrolled on MyVLE. The Library provided training to staff and students. At the end of the trial period it was recommended that e-learning be mainstreamed on campus. The committee suggested the use of the open source VLE Moodle as part of this mainstreaming to be introduced for 2005/06. The Library remains involved with Moodle by providing training to staff and handling queries from students.

• IReL (Irish Research eLibrary)

The second phase of the IReL initiative commenced in October 2004. Jointly funded by Science Foundation Ireland (SFI) and the Higher Education Authority (HEA) IReL provides researchers with access to a wide range of electronic journals. The current focus of the initiative is Biotechnology and Information and Communication Technology. To date IReL provides researchers with full-text electronic access to over 3,000 titles.

At the invitation of the HEA, the CHIU Librarians' Group submitted a business plan to the HEA in February 2005 to extend the provision of electronic resources to the Humanities and Social Sciences.

Participation in the IReL initiative resulted in a substantial increase in work for library staff. This work included liasing with academic departments, checking resources, trialing and reviewing resources, reviewing licence agreements and the preparation of files for uploading to the library website.

• Electronic services

The use of online services continued to grow with a 60% increase in searching and a 40% increase in the number of downloaded articles. *Social Science and Medicine* was the most heavily used journal.

The Electronic Journals Database grew by over 50% with the acquisition of IReL titles. The management of the database was improved by the development of new functionality to process large sets of data. The database included over 9,000 titles by September 2005.

In order to maintain the provision of examination papers online in the modularised environment the Library redesigned the examination database and created ExPERT v.2. This initiative took place as a result of funding provided by the Quality Promotion Office. The database now includes all examination papers from January 2005.

The ePrint Archive has been in operation for three years. To date, 117 users have been registered and 180 documents have been submitted. The archive continued to attract substantial external interest, with information requested by Portland State University, University of Loughborough, University of Southampton and University College Dublin.

The library website was regularly updated. Checking links and amending pages required over seven hundred amendments. The impact of IReL, the cancellation of titles, the availability of more titles online and changes in URLs accounted for the bulk of these amendments. An IReL – SFI/HEA funded services page was added and was updated continuously as new services were acquired.

• Circulation, shelving and reprographic services

There were 145,451 items loaned. This represents a decrease of 8% on last year and mirrors the international trend of decreasing usage of print collections in favour of electronic. The total number of self-service loans increased by 16% when compared with the previous year. This reflects the increased satisfaction reported by users following the improvements made the previous summer.

The number of items re-shelved decreased slightly from the previous year. The busiest month was November 2004 whereas in previous years the busiest month was March.

While remaining over the 2 million mark, the number of photocopies/prints also decreased slightly though the usage of the networked printer/photocopier increased by 25% indicating a need to review the service. Photocopying/printing charges were revised in collaboration with the Student Library Committee and a $\in 10$ value card giving 140 copies/prints was introduced.

The Copy Centre extended its hours to open on Friday afternoons due to the needs of the service. Assistance to users in the use of equipment in this area continues to be a service in high demand.

• Reserve and Short Loan Collections

Due to the restrictions of copyright legislation items added to the Reserve Collection decreased by 32% from the previous year. We appreciated the co-operation from academic staff in their efforts to seek alternative ways of making material available. These included adding books to Reserve or alerting students to the electronic version. The Reserve Collection continues to be a very heavily used service accounting for almost a quarter of all items borrowed.

• Inter-library loans

The Inter-Library Loan department processed 1,914 requests indicating a drop of 38% when compared with the previous year. Some of the decrease can be attributed to a new price structure introduced in January 2005. This saw an increase in price for postgraduate and undergraduate requests, from €6.00 and €2.00 respectively to €10.00, and a slight reduction in cost for staff request, from €12.00 to €10.00.

• Library usage

The number of registered borrowers remains short of 7,000. The peak month of occupancy was May 2005 and in the first semester, the peak month of occupancy was November 2004.

540 availed of the access schemes to other Irish and UK libraries. Outside of these schemes, 257 users applied for access to other libraries in Ireland. NUIM facilities were extended to 260 external readers.

• System developments

One of the most significant developments of the year was the creation of the Russell Library catalogue. This is a subset of the main catalogue, allowing the user to select and manipulate only those records pertaining to pre-1851 print collections held in the Russell Library.

The preparation for a major upgrade to the library management system continued. Staff received training for all modules. A Sun V440 server was purchased and installed and in April 2005 the version 16 software was installed and test data was ported to the new server. Systems downloaded, configured, tested and distributed the staff client software, together with additional support software. Substantial effort was then devoted to localisation and standardisation of the public catalogue.

• Staff and public access PCs

19 new staff PCs were purchased and 20 public access PCs were upgraded to complete the phased migration to Windows 2000. At the end of the year, 30 replacement public access PCs were ordered.

A total of 12,588 laptop loans were recorded, representing an overall loan increase of 85%. Each device was borrowed 740 times, on average, during the year. At the end of the year, 16 replacement laptops were ordered. A new laptop storage and charging unit was also purchased.

Over 500 support calls were submitted by library staff to the Systems Report Database. Only 7% of these calls required referral to the Computer Centre.

• National research survey

In April 2005, the Library participated in a national survey aimed at informing the development of library services to researchers in Irish universities. 220 NUIM respondents from the 721 targeted gave a response rate of 30.5%, the highest rate amongst the participating institutions. The Library appreciated the excellent response rate and the generous sponsorship from Maynooth Office Supplies and D.B.Office Supplies.

The Library was heartened to note the satisfaction with opening hours, the catalogue and loan policies. NUIM researchers emerged as the highest book users; the highest users of online services in the Library or from home (though the lowest from departments or offices); and the highest users of other libraries. NUIM researchers gave the lowest satisfaction rating of all institutions to the book collection. The survey highlighted the reliance on web search engines as an information resource with 92% rating these as their preferred option. Two thirds of respondents believe that online information reduces the importance of physical collections.

There was a strong belief that library funding to support research is inadequate and almost two thirds believed that research grants should assist the purchase of library collections. Almost all researchers showed a willingness to contribute their papers to an institutional archive.

• Strategic Plan

As the Library's current Strategic Plan expires at the end of 2005, a sub-committee was set up to begin preparatory work for the next plan. Following a very successful workshop for library staff three topline goals were identified:

- To be an active partner within the academic community facilitating and enriching the teaching, learning and research activities of a diverse user base in accord with the University's mission.
- 2. To promote a learning environment that encourages and advances information skills for life and fosters intellectual growth and social interaction.
- 3. To advocate the Library and its role.

• Water

One of the most popular services made available in the Library this year was the bottled waterdispensing unit. This was installed with the help of the Catering Department in April 2005. The Catering Department has indicated that it is the most heavily used unit on campus, which highlights the need for a refreshment facility in or near the Library.

Collections

• Book collection

The book and pamphlet collection in the John Paul II Library was surveyed with a view to relocating older, valuable and/or scarce material. The 1851-1920 imprint collection was identified. There are almost 11,000 items, many of which are unsuitable for open access. The main subject areas are history, geography, theology and literature.

• Book acquisition

Almost 40% of new books were received as shelf-ready thus speeding up availability. The majority of orders were submitted on the web order form available on the library's webpage.

3,779 orders were placed which represents a significant drop on the previous two years. The total book budget was 266,667, averaging the cost of a book at 55.81.

• Periodicals

The number of print subscriptions continued to decline with only 627 journals taken. Consultation with academic staff led to some titles being retained as combined print and online subscriptions. The impact of IReL was profound with the cancellation of 52 print subscriptions.

In order to increase the awareness of the availability of electronic journals and to increase their usage, 856 links were added to catalogue records. The holdings were also amended to facilitate print and online holdings displaying together when a title is taken in both formats. This built on the work already done when E shelf labels were added to the shelves to indicate online availability.

The number of periodical related enquiries increased by a third as a result of the greater availability of titles and the resulting increase in usage, particularly by undergraduates.

During the summer the four current bays of Social Science and Theology were replaced by five bays of bound shelving. This resulted in more space for both the book and periodical collections. In order to maximise the extra space available, a substantial part of material on level 2 was re-spaced. The whole move was a major undertaking and was carried out efficiently by members of the periodicals department and shelving staff.

• Audio-visual collection

4,210 items were borrowed, an increase of 35% over the previous year. This in part reflects the budget which has been spent in the last two years building up the film DVD titles.

• Legal deposit

20% more items were deposited over the previous year. Fewer claims were sent due to a decision not to claim fruitlessly from one non-compliant publisher. A substantial amount of legal deposit material was added to the catalogue. However, over €4,000 was spent from library and departmental budgets in order to purchase selected publications which should have been deposited.

• Donations

2004/05 was another excellent year for quality, timely donations. An excellent personal collection of all things cartographic and related subjects was donated by Professor John H. Andrews, retired Professor of Geography in Trinity College. This included 600 books and a large amount of ephemera and pamphlet type material.

Other material received were over 2,000 books bequeathed by Rev Liam Carey and books in modern American history donated by Professor Howard Gillette of Rutgers University.

• Exhibitions

Three exhibitions were mounted in the John Paul II Library:

Ireland's wild orchids, limited edition, Susan Sex and Brendan Sayers. November 2004. Seachtain na Gaeilge – Sloinnte na hÉireann: Taispeántas do Sheachtain na Gaeilge. March 2005. World book day – Contemporary African Novelists. March 2005.

• Bibliographic Records

Various methods of providing a new books listing were evaluated during the year but no satisfactory solution was found.

Cataloguing of over 2,500 titles from the Gerald Hanratty bequest commenced in March 2005 and cataloguing of the Wakelyn donation was completed.

11, 642 records were added to the catalogue.

• *Kildare Store*

Following a rationalisation project in the John Paul II Library, some government publications and social science periodicals were transferred to the Store. Some donations remain un-shelved due to lack of space, a room in New House was provided to give temporarily storage to a donation.

A total of 25 publications (.07% of the collection) were requested from the Store over the course of the year.

Russell Library

• Cataloguing project

Records for almost 6,500 items in the Library, including Eighteenth-century records (ESTC), were added to the catalogue.

In September 2005, a separate Russell Library catalogue was established, as a sub-set of the main NUIM catalogue, facilitating more strategic searching.

• Refurbishment

A plan for the refurbishment of the Russell Library was drawn up in expectation of a grant to resolve issues of health and safety in the Library. The plan addresses the health and safety of staff and readers – the conservation unit in particular – and the hazardous wiring, lighting and flooring.

• Publications

Peter J. Lucas (Wolfson College, Cambridge) and Angela Lucas (NUIM) published a detailed description of five Maynooth manuscripts, all from Liège: 'Lost and found: some manuscripts from Liège, now in Maynooth' in *Scriptorium*, LVIII, 1 (2004), pp83-99 with 4 plates.

• Library usage

Of the total number of items consulted by readers (1,601), half were books, including 448 pamphlets. The pamphlets were in heavy demand for student projects, and their use has increased four-fold since 2002/03.

In all there were 1,221 readers and visitors, almost half of these were NUIM postgraduates. Visitors included the Winchester Catholic Historical Group, 12-14 April, Gerard Manley Hopkins Summer School, 24 July, heads of other universities, diplomats, visiting speakers and external examiners: from

Vienna, Sydney, Haifa, Edinburgh, New York, Leeds, Stockholm, Princeton, Strathclyde, Berkeley, Budapest, Miami, Freiburg and Cambridge.

• Donations

Books were donated by Rev Dr Hugh Fenning OP, Professor Peter and Mrs Angela Lucas and Dr Maria Roginskaya.

• Class presentations and teaching

Classes given by library staff based on the collection included:

The history of the Bible; Maynooth and its traditions; The pamphlet collection; History and the Russell Library; Theology and the Russell Library; Early-printed maps; Early maps and the Spanish in America in 16th & 17th centuries; History of Printing; English MA., History of the text and research method; History MA., History of the book and good use of databases.

• Conservation in the Russell Library

The conservation of *O'Curry Ms 97* a late 16th century Irish manuscript was completed. There was significant damage to all the leaves. The individual leaves of the manuscript were mounted on their own lifting-leaf of acid-free paper and bound muniments style, quarter bound in cloth using a Chinese stitch. The process was completed with a slipcase.

The Pugin letters and drawings were restored. This collection consisted of eight documents, an envelope and five drawings including a letter from Pugin to Renehan in 1846 concerning plans for the quadrangle. The drawings were flattened, cleaned and repaired, mounted on ArtsorbTM and framed with a protective sheet of MylarTM added. The letters and envelope were wet processed repaired and placed in MylarTM envelopes for ease of handling.

The Integrated Pest Management Programme was continued throughout the year with weekly audits of insect activity. Temperature and humidity levels were monitored in the Russell Library, Pugin and the Kildare Store. Two of the three Pugin dehumidifiers were replaced.

Information gathered, in conjunction with the inspection carried out by Harwell, led to the repair of the down pipe on the wall outside where the pamphlets are shelved. The pamphlets were meanwhile removed and temporarily re-shelved. The shelves were cleaned and disinfected while repairs went on outside. Relative humidity readings were in the 90s in this location prior to repairs. This area has traditionally been the genesis of insect activity. When deemed wise, the pamphlets were returned to their original location.

The funnel on top of the Kildare Store was sealed and this, in conjunction with the repair of the outer skin of the building, has created a better, if still not ideal environment, for the book stock there.
