Staff-Student-Committee

Students from each year elect two representatives for this committee, whose purpose is to allow students to provide feedback to the Department about their educational experience. Look out for information on the nomination and election process from the MU Students' Union.

Registration, Module Information, and Credits

At the beginning of each semester, students register *online* for the modules they wish to take. Each module comes with a particular number of credits, which are also called 'ECTS credits' (ECTS = European Credit Transfer System). You need to make sure to accumulate enough credits to graduate. A normal academic year of full-time study over two semesters is worth 60 credits for undergraduates.

Lecture times and venues are found in the 'courses' section of the university website and on the departmental notice board. Please consult the module Moodle pages any changes or updates.

Tutorials

Some modules will be accompanied by tutorials. You should register for tutorials through the Moodle page or talk to your lecturer. Details of the tutorial groups and times will be posted to Moodle. Please check your modules on Moodle regularly.

STUDYING ABROAD

Experiencing time abroad can profoundly enrich one's education. Residing in a foreign country offers a fresh perspective on our own culture while opening up new horizons. Students travel abroad for their third year of study, returning to complete their final year in Maynooth before graduating. All students are invited to apply for study-abroad opportunities *early in their second year*. The entire third year is spent abroad, so that a three-year B.A. degree turns into a four-year B.A. International degree.

There are certain conditions. Thus, all students wishing to study abroad must successfully pass their first- and second-year modules. Furthermore, since one applies to study abroad early in the second year, it is important to do well in one's first-year modules. This is because our partner universities will judge applications based on first-year results. Finally, students wishing to study abroad in non-EU destinations must pass all of their modules in the summer. It is not possible to go to a non-EU country and sit the autumn repeat examinations.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

International students who wish to study philosophy at Maynooth University are free to attend most of the modules offered by the Department during the semester or year of their visit. There may be certain restrictions imposed by the student's home institution.

Note:

Our first-year modules are worth 7.5 credits each. Please pay heed to this fact when putting together your programme of studies, so that you do not end up falling short of your home institution's requirements. Modules in subsequent years are five credits.

International students select the modules in which they wish to enrol online, just like everyone else. The international coordinator of the department approves (or, in rare cases, does not approve) these choices. After arriving here, if a student needs to change a module (because of a timetabling conflict, for example) he or she should contact the international coordinator. The Philosophy Department's coordinator for international students Dr Amos Edelheit @ amos.edelheit@mu.ie will be happy to advise you.

Examination Procedures for Visiting International Students

There is no difference in how 'home' and visiting international students are assessed. This applies except if you are attending Maynooth University *only for the first semester* and a module has a final written examination in January 2024. In its place, international students who are only in Maynooth for the first semester will do an essay assignment set by the module lecturer. Details should be discussed with the module lecturer whom you should notify at the beginning of the module.

NON-PHILOSOPHY STUDENTS WISHING TO TAKE A PHILOSOPHY MODULE

Non-philosophy students who wish to take a philosophy module are more than welcome. The first-year modules will not be more difficult for them than for philosophy students. Advanced second- or third-year modules may be a different matter. Before you enrol in such a module, it is wise to speak with the lecturer concerned or with the Head of Department.

SUBMISSION PROCEDURES FOR WRITTEN WORK

Unless specified (such as Moodle discussion forum, Padlet, etc.) all written work such as essays, reaction papers etc. essays **must be submitted through Turnitin on Moodle**. You need to observe the published deadline.

In general, late submissions will not be accepted, unless you have obtained an extension from the module lecturer in advance. Submitted requests should include the reasons for your request and supporting documentation, such as medical certificates. The lecturer will let you know their decision. Please note that extensions cannot be granted beyond the end of the relevant examination period.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT AND ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

Where a student is required to produce work for assessment, it is expected that the work is the student's own work and is produced in a fair and honest manner. Students are required to be aware of and comply with the subject-specific requirements set by the individual Departments or module leaders on different assessments and need to be aware that these may differ not only by subject but also by assessment.

Academic misconduct includes plagiarism (for example, the use of unacknowledged sources in essays, assignments, or any other form of assessment), cases of personation, or of procurement or purchase of essays or other material written by others. Academic misconduct also includes unauthorised uses of Artificial Intelligence (AI) tools or other computer-generated material (i.e., outside the terms of Departmental policies).

A note on AI: Using **Generative Artificial Intelligence (Gen AI) tools** or other computer-generated material to complete all or part of an assessment without acknowledgment and outside the terms of Departmental policies or requirements for individual assignments is considered to be a breach of Academic Integrity and will be treated as such. In the Department it will be clearly signalled if the use of AI tools is permitted for a particular assignment and AI tools may be used only for those assignments, and only in the way specified.

You will need to specify according to the specific guidelines what you have used, why and how you have used it, and how you verified the produced content. If you are a MAP student using Grammarly or other, similar tools, please notify your lecturer.

Please be aware that requirements and restrictions will vary by module and subject - make sure to check with your lecturer if you are unsure. Requirements for each module can be found on Moodle.

Note: You as author are 100% responsible for the quality of your work, including all content.

Any breach of Academic Integrity will not be tolerated and may have serious consequences. If in doubt what is permitted, please speak to your lecturer.

ACADEMIC WRITING SUPPORT

The Academic Writing Support offers free, friendly, non-judgemental writing help to any student, undergraduate or postgraduate, regardless of course, degree or level. Their support is primarily through one-to-one appointments, where students can discuss their writing with peer/expert tutors. In addition, the academic writing support team offer writing workshops, support writing groups, engage in discipline-specific work, and research in academic writing and related fields.
